Dear Residents of Iberville Parish,

As we close out our second year together, I find myself reflecting on what has truly been another remarkable chapter for our parish — and on the many milestones we achieved

together in 2025, outlined below. It remains an honor to serve as your Parish President and to work alongside our residents, community leaders, and partners who share a united commitment to moving Iberville forward.



► Mississippi River Bridge Progress

One of our highest priorities continues to be the new Mississippi River Bridge. This year, the project advanced significantly as we entered the NEPA phase—the National Environmental Policy Act process. This federal process requires a thorough review of potential environmental, community, and economic impacts before a final bridge location can be selected. Our team remains fully committed to advocating for funding and ensuring continued momentum on this transformative project.



► Historic January Snowfall

The year began with a moment none of us will soon forget — a historic snowfall that blanketed our parish and brought our community together. This rare weather event highlighted Iberville's resilience, unity, and our collective ability to support one another through the unexpected. The storm's impact was

significant, causing many state and local offices to close for up to three days as crews worked to restore safe conditions across the region.



► Bayou Pigeon Boat Launch Improvement Project

In January, we broke ground with CPRA on the Bayou Pigeon
Boat Launch Improvement Project — an investment that will enhance
recreation, expand waterway access, and strengthen tourism throughout
our parish. This December, we celebrate its completion with a community
ribbon-cutting.



► Expanded Early Voting Access

In April, we expanded early voting access to residents in the East and North Iberville areas, helping ensure government remains accessible and responsive to the people it serves. This effort

marks an important step toward strengthening civic engagement across our communities.



► Iberville Day at the Capitol

On May 6th, we proudly held Iberville Day at the Capitol, highlighting our parish's successes, priorities, and vision for the future while deepening relationships with state leaders.

▶ One Iberville Master Plan Development

We began developing a new comprehensive Master Plan — the first

update in more than 20 years — and gathered valuable input from more than 350 residents and business owners during four Community Open Houses held parish-wide in November. This feedback is now guiding the creation of the draft plan, which will be presented to the public in Spring 2026.

IPRD - IBERVILLE PARKS & RECREATION

Record number of participants enjoy IPRD sports, programs in 2025

A record number of participants were involved in IPRD programs for 2025, reported IPRD Director Erik Willis. "We had a total of 1,719 kids and adults involved in a wide variety of sports and recreation programs - the most we have ever had," he said. "Part of that is because we have increased the number of programs and leagues offered, and part of it is because the number participating in various sports have increased, but it is all good news."

An example of the increase in participation is flag football, which added more than 100 kids this year. A new volleyball instruction program was added this year, and it drew over 50 kids. Willis attributed part of its success to the IPRD partnership with the Iberville Parish School Board, which provided transportation and a coach for the vollevball program.

"We also worked with the school board to bus kids to the Belleview Park for flag football this year. That not only increased the participation, but allowed the kids the opportunity to play on quality facilities at the parish's beautiful new park," Willis noted.

IPRD also partners with the School Board on its summer Camp 360 program, which provides afternoon summer camp activities for kids. IPRD is considering expanding Camp 360 to other areas of the parish in 2026.

LEAGUE PLAY

IPRD just completed its fall soccer league, which included 138 kids participating. The winter basketball leagues are beginning play, with leagues for age 6 and under and 9 and under running through December; and age 13 and under starting up in January. Registration for the 13 and under league is underway now, and play will begin in January.

IPRD is adding an adult flag football league, which will begin play in February. Register on the IPRD website: playiberville.com. Meanwhile, pickleball play is popular at various locations throughout the parish, and a league is being considered for that sport in 2026. Meanwhile, registration for diamond sports begins January 1.

Sessions were held in White Castle, St. Gabriel, Rosedale, and Plaquemine. More than 350 residents and business owners attended the series, offering valuable ideas and insights to guide the Parish's long-term vision.

At each Open House, attendees met with the One Iberville project team and Parish staff, including President Chris Daigle, to learn about the plan's purpose, time line, and goals, while sharing their own perspectives on land use, community needs, recreation opportunities, future projects, and what makes life in Iberville unique. This feedback is now being compiled and analyzed as the planning team begins shaping the draft master plan, which will be released for public review in Spring 2026.

President Daigle thanks residents and business owners for their participation and passion. "We can't make the One Iberville master plan without every community in Iberville Parish raising their voice. These meetings and the online survey offered to residents in the fall gave residents the opportunity to tell us what you want the next 20 years to look like in Iberville Parish. It's your master plan — and we are shaping tomorrow together," he said.







CITY OF PLAQUEMINE

City sewer, drainage projects mark year-end infrastructure improvements

North Plaquemine sewer plant conversion:

The north Plaquemine sewer plant, which was failing, is being converted into a pumping station with a force main that pumps wastewater to the much larger pumping station on W.W. Harleaux St. It will then be piped through existing pipes to the sewer plant south of Plaquemine.

Phase one of this conversion into a pumping station is complete. Work on Phase two, the force main to pipe the wastewater to the W.W. Harleaux station is only about 30% complete. That includes 2,400 linear feet of 12-inch force main to the W.W. Harleaux plant. That project is expected to be complete by next summer. Pump station upgrades:

Meanwhile, upgrades to a number of pumping stations throughout the city are almost complete, with only cleanup remaining. They include the Bell St., Plaza Drive, Commodore Street, Senator Gay Drive and Orange Street pumping stations. **Drainage projects:**

The city has also completed two drainage projects. A concrete lining was installed to improve drainage in three overgrown ditches east of Nathan Georgetown Street. The other project involved adding riprap and a concrete flume to repair erosion on both sides of Evangeline Avenue ditch which had exposed gas lines.

State mandate forces rate study, water and sewer rate increases

Due to a recent rate study pursuant to the La. Division of Administration's Water Sector Program, it was determined that the City of Plaquemine's current water and sewer rate structure is below a sustainable average. Louisiana Article 7, sec. 14a of the state constitution prohibits the city from operating at a loss.

In addition, to remain eligible to receive funding and grants from the state for future infrastructure improvements, the City of Plaquemine was required to adopt rates that can sustain the operations of the City's water and sewer systems.

As a result, the Board of Selectmen, in coordination with the Mayor, approved an adjustment in water and sewer rates in December. This decision was made to ensure the continued maintenance and improvement of essential city services and infrastructure. The following shows existing rates and rates for 2026:

WATER - 2025 RATES:

Residential inside city \$5.00 base rate + \$2.75 per each 1,000 gal. Residential outside city \$7.00 base rate + #3.25 per each 1,000 gal.

WATER - 2026 RATES:

\$10 for 1st 3,000 gal. + \$4.60 per 1,000 gal. after Residential inside city \$14 for 1st 3,000 gal. + \$5.10 per 1,000 gal. after Residential outside city

Sewer - 2025 RATES:

\$5.00 base rate + \$5.50 per each 1,000 gal Residential inside city \$7.00 base rate + \$6.00 per each 1,000 gal Residential outside city

Sewer - 2026 Rates:

\$6.50 base rate + \$8.00 per 1,000 gal Residential inside city: Residential outside city: \$8.50 base rate + \$8.50 per 1,000 gal

Plaquemine marks 250th anniversary

The City of Plaguemine marked its 250th anniversary in 2025. The city was founded in 1775, but the area was first inhabited by Chitimache and Houma Indian tribes because Bayou Plaguemine was an important waterway for trade and travel. It connected inland villages to the Mississippi River.

When the French and Spanish explorers reached the area, they relied on the same bayou routes that the Indigenous nations had established. The settlement grew into a village, and eventually into a city.

Bayou Plaquemine became one of Louisiana's most important early passages. In fact, while the Plaquemine Lock was operational in the early to mid 1900s, thousands of boats went through the Lock annually and supported a bustling downtown economy. Today, the city boasts a more diverse economy and a vibrant community.











All Is Bright event, Christmas decorations bring holiday cheer

Residents love the new holiday lighting that was added to buildings around the city in December. The good news is that the lighting is permanent, with the city having the ability to program the lighting in various colors for various holidays. The buildings include City Hall, the Tony Gulotta Bayou Waterfront Park, Depot Marketplace and old city hall (Iberville Museum). The city added to the Christmas cheer with its annual All Is Bright Hometown Christmas celebration on downtown Railroad Avenue on December 6. The event draws thousands downtown for the free visits with Santa, children's rides and activities, holiday lighting, food and music. This year's edition also included some 70 booth vendors. 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IBERVILLE PARISH ASSESSOR

First responders can now get additional property tax exemption

Iberville's first responders will have the benefit of an additional property tax exemption starting in 2025, thanks to voters and the Iberville Parish Council, said Deputy Assessor Clint Seneca.

Louisiana voters, in November of 2023, approved an amendment for parish governing bodies to allow another \$2,500 exemption for first responders on top of the \$7,500 homestead exemption that all residential property owners already receive. Both exemptions are on the assessed valuation of property that is owned and occupied by a qualifying first responder. The Iberville Parish Council approved this exemption for Iberville first responders in 2024.

"We fully endorsed this exemption with the Parish Council," said Seneca. "Both Assessor Randy Sexton and I recognize that our first responders often put their lives on the line in helping our residents, and provide life-saving services in their daily work. We owe them our gratitude, and this extra exemption is one way we can thank them for all that they do for our community."

An annual application and documentation is required to claim the exemption. To qualify for the exemption, first responders have to reside in the same parish in which their employer is located. The exemption is open to firefighters (both paid and volunteer), police officers and deputies, peace officers, and emergency medical responders and dispatchers.

First responders must be full-time public employees. Volunteer firefighters must complete more than 24 hours of firefighter continuing education and be a member of the La. State Firemen's Association or on the roster of the Volunteer Firefighter Insurance Program.

Pre-trial Diversion Program offers option for non-violent offenders

A major priority for District Attorney Tony Clayton is to prevent offenders, especially first time offenders, from becoming violent criminals. One tool used by the District Attorney's Office to deter criminal activity is the Pre-Trial Diversion

The Pre-Trial Diversion Program (PTD) is a voluntary diversion program that is offered to select *non-violent* offenders as an alternative to prosecution. The program is offered to eligible offenders after the case has been reviewed by the District Attorney's office and it is determined that the offender meets the eligibility criteria.

"I think it's important that someone with no prior criminal record be given a second chance if possible." said District Attorney Tony Clayton. "Each case is considered individually, but we use this program to try to address underlying issues that will help them become productive citizens."

The Pre-Trial Diversion Program is designed to deter offenders from future criminal and/or disorderly behavior. It provides the offender an opportunity to gain awareness of the consequences of future criminal behavior, to avoid additional expenses related to criminal prosecution, and should he/she successfully complete the program, to have his/her charges refused or dismissed by the District Attorney's Office.

Additionally, an offender's participation in the program will lessen the load on the Court System, the Clerk of Court, and Law Enforcement Agencies. Pre-Trial Diversion can be highly beneficial for first time offenders and is a useful tool when deciding how to proceed in certain cases.

While not easy, this program has proven to be effective. Depending on the offense charged, the defendant will be on extended probation, will still pay some fees, will be required to complete random drug screenings at the defendant's expense, and will be required to complete a number of on-line courses. Those courses are specified by the DA's Office based on the offense.

TOWN OF WHITE CASTLE

Major projects will be underway in 2026

The Town of White Castle will begin work on three major infrastructure projects in 2026. The most exciting project is the new training facility. Ground-breaking for that building will be held in January.

The town was awarded a \$4.136 million grant for the new training and multi-purpose center, which will off technical and technology training, including HVAC, mechanic, electrical, technical and other training programs. Mayor John Morris thanked State Senator Ed Price, State Rep. Ken Brass and former State Rep. Chad Brown for their work in obtaining the grant funding.

The town will also begin work on a new \$4 million sewer plant and on drainage and road improvements in 2026. Funding for the sewer plant came through the La. Department of Environmental Quality and it will be located at the site of the existing plant. It will bid in late 2026. The \$800,000 road/drainage project will address some drainage issues in town, and include some street patching and overlays. Phase one of that project will begin in January.



Iberville Clerk of Court announces election updates for 2026

As Louisiana enters the New Year, significant changes are coming to the state's election process. Beginning in spring 2026, Louisiana will implement Closed Party Primaries. The Closed Party Primary Election is set for May 16, 2026, and the Closed Primary General Election is set for June 27, 2026.

In a Closed Party Primary, Democratic voters may cast ballots only for Democratic candidates, and Republican voters only vote for Republican candidates.

For the first time. No Party voters may participate

ONLY by completing a Declaration of Ballot Choice and selecting either a Democratic or Republican ballot, or choosing an unaffiliated ballot. Once a choice is made in the first primary, it cannot be changed for the second. Importantly, selecting a party ballot does not alter official voter registration.

Voters registered with other parties, such as Green or Libertarian, are not eligible to participate in Closed Party Primaries but may vote in other races. Offices included in these closed party primaries are BESE, U.S. Senate, U.S. House of Representatives, Public Service Commissioner, and the Louisiana Supreme Court.

Following the spring primaries, the selected Democratic and Republican candidates will advance to the Open Congressional General Election on November 3, 2026, where all voters, regardless of registration, may vote for any candidate for U.S. Senate and U.S. House of Representatives.

State Rep. Brown resigns to take state post

In addition, Iberville Parish will hold a special election to fill the unexpired term for House District 60, previously held by State

Representative Chad Brown. The primary election is scheduled for February 7, 2026, with early voting from January 24 through January 31. The general or runoff election will take place on March 14, 2026. This district includes Iberville and Assumption Parishes, with all Iberville precincts participating except 31 and 32 in Maringouin. Unlike the Closed Party Primaries, this will be an Open Election.

Office, we extend our best wishes to Representative Brown in his new role as Commissioner of the Louisiana Office of Alcohol and Tobacco Control and express our gratitude for his 10 years of dedicated service to our community. Loaded fall election ballot

Xray scanner provides extra secuirty at jail

A new X-ray scanner has been installed at the Iberville Parish Jail which increases jail security and decreases the ability of inmates to bring contriband into the jail.
